Delivering trail projects with an eye to the future

Welcome to the 2024 Queenstown Trails Annual General Meeting. As Chairman, it is my pleasure to present this annual report. Queenstown Trails is in strong shape, and we are proud to be in the process of delivering new trails that have been seven years in the making. The Queenstown Trails team have been working hard to manage this demanding project through extreme weather events and a challenging economic climate.

Construction work on the Wharehuanui Trail, that links Arrowtown to Arthurs Point, progressed well through Summer, despite encountering unexpected geological conditions. We have been so impressed and grateful for the resourceful solutions that the geotechnical engineers, trail builders and project managers were able to reach, minimising construction delays and associated costs.

We are also deeply grateful for the support and patience of the community and tour operators as construction and sign off time frames stretched. It has been such a pleasure to open the Wharehuanui Trail and see everyone loving it as much as we do.

The second phase of the Queenstown Trails expansion project has been progressing very well. Construction tenders were awarded back at the beginning of the year, and since then, progress has been flying, with the bridge, trail and tunnel works being undertaken simultaneously.

His projections for bike tourism in Queenstown, and the wider Otago region, paint an exciting and promising picture for the shape of the industry's future, and are key in shaping the direction of future projects.

Benje is a keen and accomplished ultra runner and has great energy and passion for the trails.



The executive team has been developing enhanced mapping, mobile accessibility and updating wayfinding signage to increase the ease of navigating the network. They have also been working on collaborative projects for shelters, interpretation panels, charging stations, rest areas, lay-down zones and hydration stations to provide an even better experience for locals, visitors and operators.



Fundraising and sponsorship has never been more important for Queenstown Trails. In addition to project delivery expenses, the funding landscape for cycle trails and cycle infrastructure has undergone some significant changes in the past year. With the reduction of funding from central government, we are developing sustainable funding streams that will allow us to continue the work we do. We are thrilled to have Duncan Ashford step into the Partnerships Manager Role, and look forward to drawing on his experience and knowledge to benefit the trails.

The escalation of construction costs, coupled with inflation and advancements in engineering requirements, has resulted in the current projects costing quite a bit more than initial projections. We are deeply grateful for the generosity of several major donors, and the staggering support we receive from our loyal community of Trail Lovers, all of whom are helping us to realise our vision for the future of Queenstown Trails.

At the end of the 2023-2024 financial year, our financial position appears to be relatively strong. However, as we continue through the current project delivery phase, we are starting to eat into the Trusts reserves. It is more important than ever to continue to attract donations, sponsorship and for QTT to fundraise for future projects.



Finally, a huge thank you to all the people and businesses in our community who support the Queenstown Trail - the list is too long to do it justice without leaving someone out.

We really could not continue to maintain and expand this world class trail network without the support of our community.

Chief Executive's Report



These are exciting times for trails in Central Otago, with new projects underway to expand and link Great Rides and communities together. As we explore further opportunities for improved regional connections (think Queenstown to Glenorchy, Kawarau Gorge), Queenstown Trails is leading the charge to lift the profile of the Great Rides and double the annual visitor expenditure in NZ from \$1b to \$2b over the next 10 years, with the completion of two exciting new trails to fulfill our proposition as one of the best cycling experiences in New Zealand, if not the world!

We were delighted to open The Wharehuanui Trail (linking Arthurs Point to Arrowtown) earlier this month, just in time for the school holidays. This off-road route spanning 17km fills a gap in the Queenstown Trail network along the northern perimeter of the Whakatipu Basin, with the added benefit of integrating with the mountain bike trails on Coronet Peak, Coronet Loop and the Mahu Whenua trails.

Simultaneously, construction along the Shotover Gorge Trail has been full steam ahead. The Kimi-ākau Bridge is all but complete, and construction of the trail linking the bridge to the Hugo Tunnel has made great progress throughout the year. As long as the recent wet weather stays away, we are hoping that all aspects of the Shotover Gorge Trail will be completed early 2025.

KIMI-ĀKAU BRIDGE

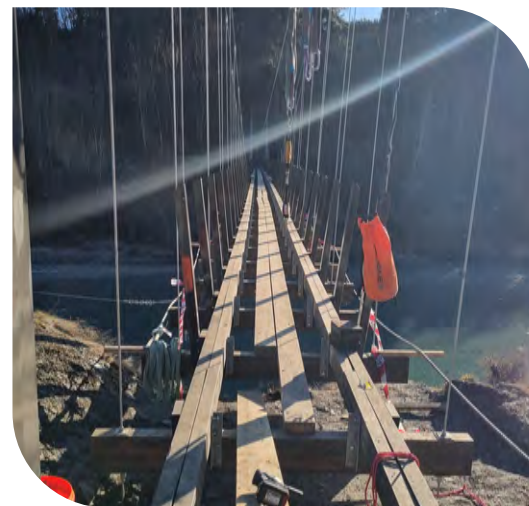
Kimi-ākau bridge construction began in early 2024. Test anchors and foundations were drilled, and then the bridge towers and cables flown in by helicopter. Once the suspension cables were fixed, abseil specialists constructed the bridge deck. It was amazing to see how quickly the bridge was completed: it is an impressive and beautiful structure.

Although tendered prices were higher than anticipated at feasibility stage, costs have been re-couped through philanthropist donations and a very successful 'sponsor a plank' campaign which enabled the community to get involved with funding the project.

SPONSOR A PLANK INITIATIVE

Our incredibly well supported *Great Kimi-ākau Bridge Plank Challenge* was kick-started by long time Queenstown Trails supporters Julian and Lizanne Knights.

All 110 bridge planks were sponsored by individuals, businesses and community groups, raising \$165k towards the Kimi-ākau Bridge.

HUGO TUNNEL

A Community Management Agreement with the Department of Conservation has allowed work to begin on the Hugo Tunnel at Big Beach. The Hugo Tunnel has been funded by an extremely generous donation from the Hugo Charitable Trust.

The 108m long historic mining tunnel is located near the mouth of the lower Shotover Gorge. The construction of the tunnel was planned during the gold-rush but not constructed until 1962.

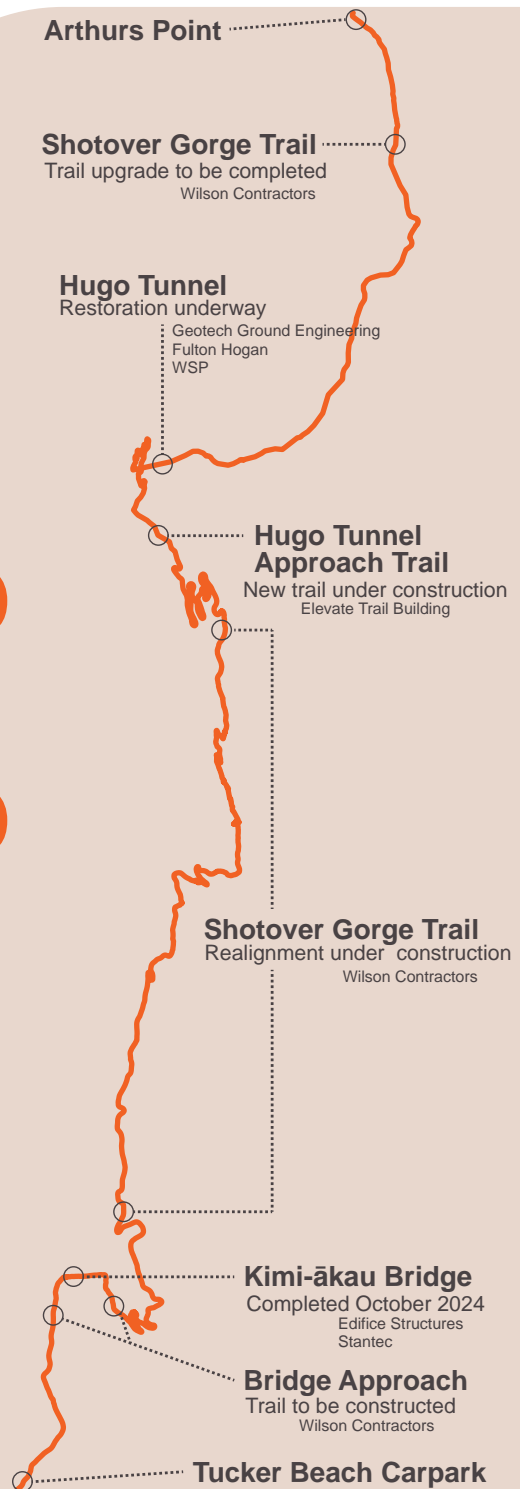
The *Hugo Tunnel* has special significance to the Hugo Charitable Trust because of Hugh Greens history in the civil construction industry. Hugh's company Green & McCahill Ltd were involved in many major tunnel projects around New Zealand.

Tunnel restoration works include stabilisation of the tunnel portals, removal of rock-fall material, installation of rock bolts, structural anchors and mesh, and construction of the new trail surface.

The 'Hugo Tunnel' is being restored now and should be open to the public by early 2025.

As Kaitiaki, guardians for the land, protecting and caring for our spectacular natural landscape is key.

Throughout these trail projects, conservation outcomes for wetland restoration, replanting native species and predator control are enabled by enhanced access. We're delighted that the trails allow our community to experience first-hand the amazing work of the Whakatipu Reforestation Trust and Mana Tahuna, as well as allowing Southern Lakes Sanctuary and the Whakatipu Wildlife Trust to increase their trapping efforts; collaborations which build on our mantra of 'better together'.

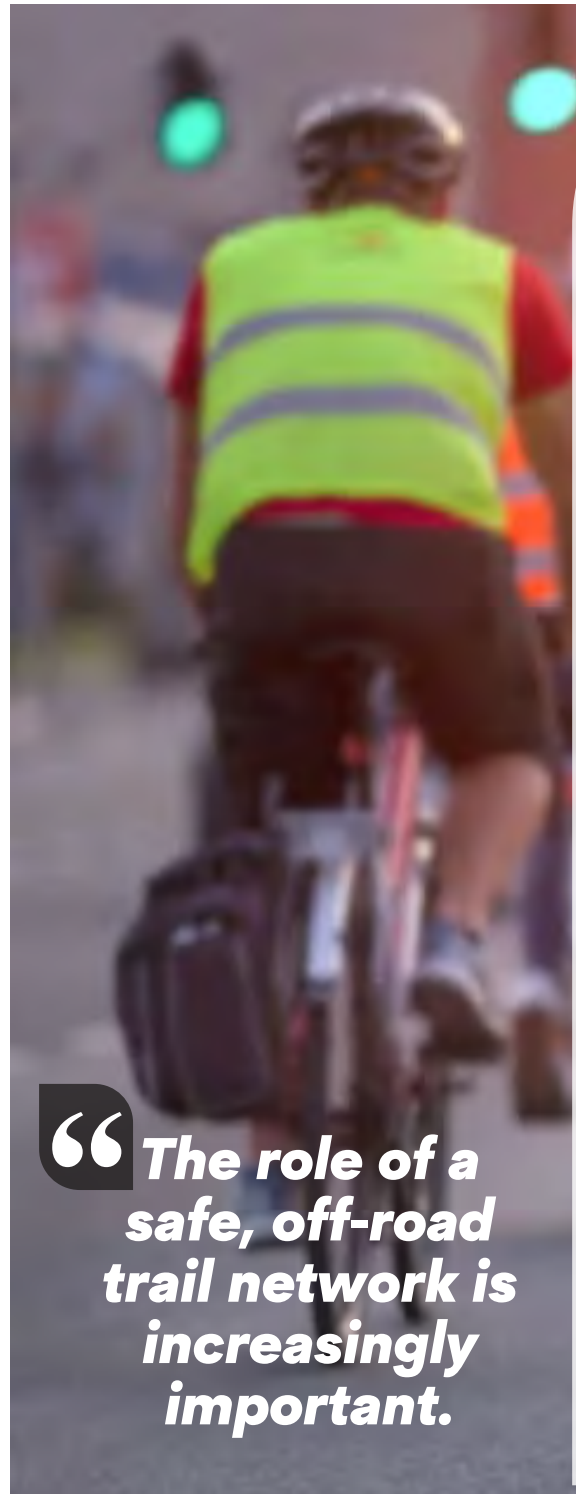
We are so proud of our partnership with QEII and Soho Properties to establish and maintain the superb backcountry trails of the Mahu Whenua Open Space Covenants, where collectively we are able to keep the tracks in open and in good shape, despite the challenging terrain and conditions endured through the winter weather. We're fortunate to have the skills of world class trail builders like Elevate Trails and Dirt Design Trails, who we can engage at short notice to ensure the tracks are good to open each spring.



Queenstown Trails is indebted to the QLDC Parks and Reserves Team who contribute to the QEII Trail Maintenance Fund, as well as managing the overall Queenstown Trail Maintenance Contract – recognising that the trails we deliver result in Queenstown being a great place to live, work or establish business.

During the past year we have worked with Council to produce new and improved way finding signage.

We are grateful to work with QLDC to ensure timely repairs and a schedule of on going maintenance to continue to improve and enhance the safety and enjoyment of the trail user experience.



Unfortunately, the development of an Active Transport network is not moving at the same pace, with a challenging economic climate and withdrawal of government funding for cycling and pedestrian projects.

All this at a time when the role of a safe off-road trail network is becoming increasingly important to reduce congestion, reach carbon emission targets and encourage behavioural change.

Despite our best efforts to advocate for improved cycling and walking opportunities in our suburbs and lobby Waka Kotahi/NZTA to deliver on their promise, it seems increasingly likely that QTT will need to step in where necessary to fill in the gaps and create opportunities.

We continue to support and provide stunning courses for major events like the Queenstown Marathon and Motatapu, which remain a valuable charitable partner for us despite the challenging event scene and cost of living crisis. We're also thankful to smaller events like the Backyard Ultra and Southern Lakes Ultra for making donations towards the trails they use, and more and more commercial operators are stepping up to provide a donation per-user, to put back into the trails their business benefits from.



We're in the fortunate position of our trails being established in one of the most scenic locations in the world, and with the new additions to the network being unveiled to the public this year, the Queenstown Trails are set to provide more opportunities for events and commercial expansion.

Our region, as a whole, is going from strength to strength in terms of becoming a global cycle tourism destination, with the great work being done by DQ and the Trailhub collective from CODC to highlight our proposition.

With QTT trails becoming integrated with, and dovetailing into the awesome QMTBC trails, we really do have options for every ability.

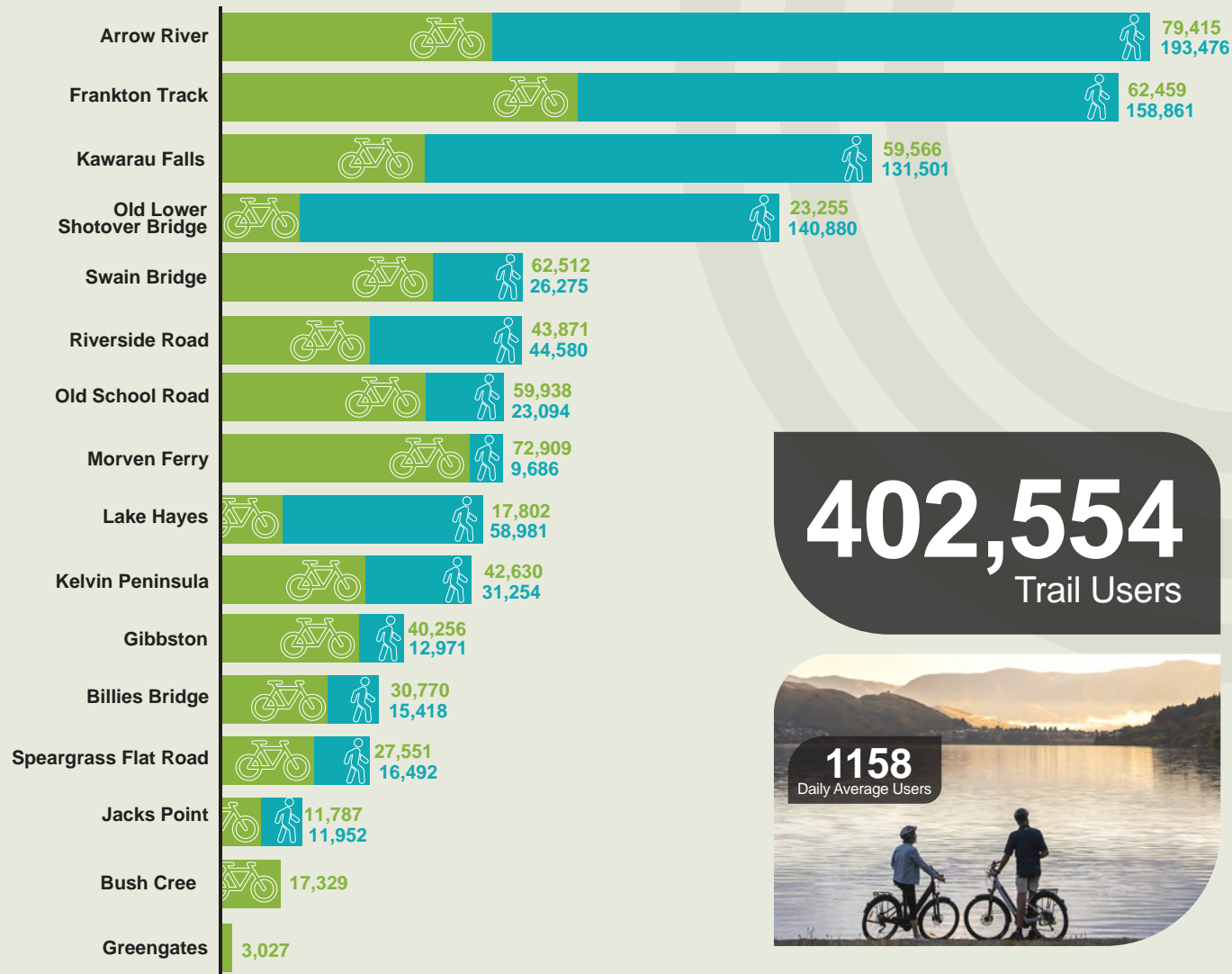
