As Chairman of the Queenstown Trails Trust it is my pleasure to provide this annual report.

The Queenstown Trails Trust is in good shape and growing.

OVERVIEW OF 2020/21

My first year as Chairman saw a seamless transition as I was hugely supported by our patron, the Trustees, and Mark Williams, our CEO.

The year certainly has flown by as we work to expand our network of trails. The positive attitude towards and appreciation of the trail network continues to grow, as can be seen in another great year of Friends of the Trust contributions.

The community was deeply saddened to lose patron Sir Eion Edgar in June of this year. He and his family had a significant impact on the creation, maintenance, and future direction of the Queenstown Trail. As part of his legacy, we received donations in excess of \$68,000 when his family asked people to donate to the Trust in his memory.

ACTIVITY

- Consent was granted for the Arrowtown to Arthurs Point extension link. A great success three years in the making!
- The Coronet Peak Loop trail is underway and due for completion in early 2022.
- The face of tourism is changing and we have engaged TRC to assist with a review of our strategic plan to see us through a post-Covid world and into regenerative tourism.

2021, another challenging year for the world, but also one full of promise for the trail network.

CHANGING TIMES

Whilst the pandemic is still shaping the world as we know it, the silver lining has been the unprecedented growth and recognition of the trails, coupled with the demand for bike purchase and hire.

As the region grapples with the downturn of international tourism, the trails have become a major attraction for locals and domestic tourists, encouraging them to get out and explore their own backyard.

Destination Queenstown recognises the important role the trails play when people choose to visit or settle here and have embarked on a Biking Market Development Plan. This plan will support the region's goals of regenerative tourism, as cycle tourism slows people down, allowing them to connect more closely with the communities and cultural heritage of the area.

Through the review of the Otago Conservation Management Strategy with DOC, we were pleased to see many local groups and trusts come together and recognise that enhanced access can lead to improved conservation outcomes. We look forward to ongoing collaboration with them. In recent years, the Trust's remit has expanded beyond the Great Ride as we seek to develop a truly integrated network from wide, shared commuter trails, to epic backcountry singletrack rides.

We continue to support the development of useful, integrated connections to the trail network and are fortunate to have groups like the Lightfoot Initiative fighting in the Active Transport corner. The legislative process when working across the various government agencies certainly presents it challenges, and we will continue to advocate for funding to be to be invested in a logical manner on connections that are not yet developed.

The Central Otago-Queenstown Trail Network Trust opened the Lake Dunstan Trail in May with fantastic numbers so far. Consent for the Kawarau Gorge Trail will be dependent on the outcome of the CMS review.





TRAIL DEVELOPMENT & COLLABORATION

We are pleased to report that consent was granted and work will begin on the trail from Arrowtown to Arthurs Point this summer. We have begun a design to repurpose the tunnel at Big Beach, and the bridge for Tucker Beach will follow once the Otago CMS decision is confirmed in early 2022.

We had a really successful collaboration with the QMTBC on the new Hot Rod track, with over 12,000 descents in the first 3 months of opening pre-winter! We have more projects in the pipeline in conjunction with QMTBC and are really stoked to keep that momentum building.

Our partnership with Soho Properties and QEII goes from strength to strength, with fantastic progress on the Coronet Loop Trail, expected to open in 2022. As part of the Loop, we embarked on a Bush Creek Trail upgrade and have begun to develop a plan to restore the Raceman's Hut chimney on the Coronet Face Water Race.

You may have seen some fantastic interpretive panels recently installed around the district. Many thanks to Marion and the Queenstown Historical Society for bringing the stories of the region's first settlers to life along the trails.















TRAIL MAINTENANCE & REPAIRS

Extreme weather events seem to be on the rise due to climate change, and these storms have impacted more trails this year. Christine's Hill got a much needed overhaul following major scour damage in July last year. The Millennium Trail bridge over the Arrow River also required a major footing rebuild.

We are indebted to MBIE for their 'Extreme Event' fund which enables us to apply for funding to get these weather damaged sections fixed as soon as possible. We truly value the partnership we have with the QLDC Parks and Reserves Team who assist in completing repairs. In addition to the major repairs, we focused on a few minor slumps and retaining walls. We also resurfaced a particularly tired section of the Twin Rivers Trail between the Old Lower Shotover Bridge and Old School Rd.

Council supports the Trust with an annual administration grant, which provides a return on investment through QTT's ability to leverage MBIE co-funding for significant trail projects and trail manager support. This year we were able to access over \$225,000 towards trail maintenance projects.
